Synopsis

Amelia Bedelia sets out to clean the Rogers' house. Mrs. Rogers leaves her there alone with a list of instructions, as she and Mr. Rogers will be gone for the day. The instructions were quite simple.

Before completing her list of duties, Amelia bakes a lemon-meringue pie to surprise them.

To the readers delight, Amelia Bedelia then proceeds to follow Mrs. Rogers' instructions exactly as they are written. She changes the towels in the green bathroom by cutting designs in them, puts dusting powder all over the furniture, draws a picture of the drapes when the sun comes in, "dresses" the chicken, and so on.

Mr. and Mrs. Rogers return home and are shocked to see what Amelia has done. Mrs. Rogers is about to fire her when Mr. Rogers puts a bite of the pie in her mouth. They both quickly decide Amelia must stay, and Mrs. Rogers learns to say undust the furniture, close the drapes and things like that.

Biographical Sketch

Peggy Parish was born on July 14, 1927 in Manning, South Carolina. She graduated from the University of South Carolina with a degree in English. She taught school in Oklahoma, Kentucky and in New York City where she taught third grade for many years at the Dalton School. After teaching, Parish decided to write a book. At first her manuscripts were rejected until she met some editors who helped her with her first books.

After 1962 Peggy Parish wrote over thirty-five books for children including her popular Amelia Bedelia series. Peggy Parish died on November 18, 1988 at the age of 61.

Critic's Corner

In The Read-Aloud Handbook, Jim Trelease describes Amelia Bedelia as "America's most loveable maid since Hazel."

Meaning Study

"such a grand house." grand -(impressive in size or appearance)

meringue -"I'll make a lemon-meringue pie." (frothy topping of beaten egg whites and sugar)

change change the towels in the green bathroom. (to remove and replace with something different)

snipped - she snipped a little here and a little there. (to cut with small, quick strokes, as with a scissors)

Dust the furniture dust -(to wipe dust from)

furniture - "At my house we undust the furniture." (tables, chairs, cabinets, desks, etc.)

draw -Draw the drapes when the sun comes in. (to close)

aired -"So those things need to be aired out, too." (to put out in air for freshening)

measure - Measure two cups of rice. (to set aside a certain amount)

trim -... trim the fat before you put the steak in the icebox. (to remove by cutting)

icebox -(refrigerator)

dress -And please dress the chicken. (prepare for cooking)

Comprehension Study

1. What was the first thing Amelia Bedelia did after the Rogers (She made a lemon-meringue pie.)

- 2. Describe Amelia Bedelia.
- 3. Describe the Rogers' house.
- 4. How did Amelia Bedelia change the towels in the green bathroom?

 (She got some scissors and snipped a little here and a little there.)
- 5. When dusting the furniture, what did Amelia do? (She put dusting powder all over it.)
- 6. Instead of closing the drapes when the sun came in, what did Amelia do?

 (She drew a picture of the drapes.)
- 7. Did Mrs. Rogers want Amelia to unscrew the light bulbs and take them outside to be aired out?

 (No, she wanted her to turn the lights off when she was done in the living room.)
- 8. What did Amelia trim the fat on the steak with? (Lace and bits of ribbon.)
- 9. How did Amelia dress the chicken? (She put clothes on it.)
- 10. If you were Mr. or Mrs. Rogers, what would you have done when you found out what Amelia had done? (Accept reasonable answers.)
- 11. What was the reason that Mr. and Mrs. Rogers did not fire Amelia?

 (After tasting the pie she baked, they were willing to be more specific in directions, as long as she was there to make lemonmeringue pies.)

Student Involvement Activities

- 1. Read the other Amelia Bedelia books to or with your class.
- Following the reading of the Amelia Bedelia books, read The King Who Rained, Chocolate Moose For Dinner, A Little Pigeon Toad, and Eight Ate: A Feast Of Homonym Riddles to or with your class, for a discussion on homonyms.
- 3. This would be an opportune time to instruct your class on homonyms.
- 4. As a group, rewrite the following directions so that Amelia could follow them correctly:
 - Change the towels in the green bathroom.
 - Measure two cups of rice.
 - Please trim the fat before you put the steak in the icebox.
 - Please dress the chicken.
- 5. Have your students write more instructions for Amelia Bedelia to follow at the Rogers' house.
- After reading all of the Amelia Bedelia books with your class, write, illustrate and publish a new Amelia Bedelia book by your class.

- 7. Have your students illustrate their favorite scene from the book to be displayed on the bulletin board.
- 8. Have your students bring in their favorite pie recipe from home—these could be made into a class booklet called "Our Favorite Pies."
- 9. With the help of parent volunteers, make lemon-meringue pies and have an Amelia Bedelia party.
