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SYNOPSIS

Chap. 1 A Boy and a Mountain The story is set in 1865. Sixteen-year-old Rudi Matt's delicate appearance belies his physical and mental strength. Rudi has snuck out from his job as a dishwasher at the Beau Site Hotel to climb the Blue Glacier, one of the smaller mountains that surround his small Swiss village of Kurtal. Rudi's stops at his father's shrine to pray. The Citadel stands unconquered, the last great summit of the Alps. Only one man has ever dared to approach the top, and that man died in his pursuit. He was Josef Matt, Rudi father. Rudi has never known his father because the accident took place shortly before Rudi's birth. As he climbs, Rudi hears a voice from deep in one of the crevasses in the glacier!

Chap. 2 A Boy and a Man Rudi bravely uses his clothes to rig up a rescue line to save the man's life. The man is the famous British mountain climber Captain John Winter, who is astonished at Rudi's bravery and strength. Rudi shares his extensive knowledge of the mountains and reveals his passion for climbing. He also admits that his mother, Ilse Matt, and Uncle Franz Lerner insist he go into the hotel business to avoid the danger of being a climber or a guide.

Chap. 3 Two Hundred Dirty Dishes Old Teo Zurbriggen, a famous mountain climber before an accident left him crippled and now the chef at the hotel, covers for Rudi. Later, Winter tells Franz how Rudi saved his life and invites Rudi to join him climbing the Wunderhorn the next day. His mother and uncle agree to let him go this one time.

Chap. 4 Trial— Rudi dreams of conquering the Citadel. He is thrilled to learn Winter has bought him the finest mountain climbing gear. Klaus Wesselhoft, a muscular 18-year-old guide, teases Rudi for being so small, calling him "Angelface." The hikers gather at a small hut. Rudi is delighted to be serving as a porter on the hike.

Chap. 5 And Error As they hike, Franz reveals he hates the Citadel, because it was there his brother-in-law, Rudi's father, died. A mistake by Rudi endangers the other hikers.

Chap. 6 Master and Pupil Teo takes Rudi on climbing lessons, on the "practice" Felsberg peak. Rudi dreams of planting his father's red shirt on the Citadel's summit as a tribute to his father's attempt to scale the peak. Josef Matt died while staying with Sir Edward, who had broken a leg during a fall. He froze to death in a cave before the rescue party arrived.

Chap. 7 A Prisoner Escapes Rudi repairs his father's shirt and fights with Klaus. Captain Winter has gone to Broli.

Rudi sneaks off on another forbidden hike.

Chap. 8 White Fury At the hut, Rudi finds Winter and meets Emil Saxo, a massive guide from Broli. Winter agrees to take Rudi on as an apprentice porter as they reconnoiter the mountain. As they hike, they get caught in an avalanche.

Chap. 9 The Challenge Back home, Rudi's uncle and mother discover he is gone. Franz decides to go to the Citadel, where they think Rudi has gone.

Chap. 10 Three to Make Ready Rudi frees himself first. Then Saxo climbs out and they free Winter, who has a bad gash in his head. The next day, Winter and Saxo go to Broli for more supplies. They will ask Franz if Rudi can climb with them.

Chap. 11 Alone Rather than returning home, Rudi sets off on a solitary climb up the Citadel. He feels drawn on and continues his way up the mountain, alone.

Chap. 12 A Boy and a Ghost Rudi takes shelter in the cave where his father died. Rudi feels beset by demons, but his fear recedes when he sees the "demon" as his father protecting him.

Chap. 13 Four to Go Saxo mistakes the rescue party for an attempt by the Kurtal men to reach the Citadel first. Rudi appears and exclaims he has found the way to the Citadel summit. The rival guides quarrel but finally agree to join forces.

Chap. 14 First of All Men Four men set off; five remain in the hut. Establishing an uneasy truce, they climb all day toward the Citadel.

Chap. 15 The Needle's Eye Winter gets weaker, suffering from a wracking cough in the thin air. Each of the adult guides attempts to pass through a narrow tunnel but only Rudi can fit. From the other side, he hauls the men up to the next peak.

Chap. 16 Darkness and Dawn The final reach of the Citadel is now clear, but Winter is too ill to go on. Nonetheless, Saxo takes off. Rudi follows him.

Chap. 17 The Day Back at town, the climbers are being watched through a telescope. Teo and others set off on a rescue mission. Franz and Winter go after Saxo and Rudi as well. They find Rudi's abandoned pack and wonder what has happened.

Chap. 18 The Heights Rudi catches up with Saxo, who falls while defying Rudi. Saxo is trapped on a ledge because of his broken arm. Rudi rescues Saxo rather than climb to the summit. After a brutal climb down, they collapse by the Needle. Winter and Franz rescue them after they reach the summit.

Chap. 19 The Conqueror They continue the brutal

descent, finally reaching Teo's welcoming arms. At the celebration, Winter denies the honor and says the Citadel is "Rudi's mountain." Winter has hung Josef's red shirt from the summit to fulfill Rudi's dream.

TIME LINE

	1682	The name	"Matterhorn"	is first used
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- 1786 Aug. 8 Michel-Gabriel Paccard and Jacques Balmat reach the top of Mont Blanc, the highest peak in the Alps.
- 1811 The ice field known as the Jungfrau is ascended.
- 1820 An avalanche kills most members of the Hamel expedition.
- 1843 Scottish scientist James D. Forbes publishes Travels through the Alps of Savoy, which sparks British interest in the Alps.
- 1854 Alfred Wills ascends the Wetterhorn; this marks the beginning of the "Golden Age" of mountaineering.
- 1857 The British Alpine Club is founded; Sigismund Porges successfully climbs the Monch.
- 1861 Edward Whymper fails in his first attempt to ascend the Matterhorn; Sir Leslie Steven climbs the Streckhorn.
- 1865 July 14 Edward Whymper and six others reach the top of the Matterhorn. During their descent, four members of the party fall to their deaths.
 - July 17 Jean-Antoine Carrel makes the second ascent of the Matterhorn, climbing the more difficult Italian Ridge.
- 1866 The British government decides against a ban on mountain climbing.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

James Ramsey Ullman was born November 24, 1907, in New York City. Ullman had a first-class education, receiving his B.A. degree from Princeton University in 1929. He immediately put his degree to good use as a newspaper reporter and feature writer. In 1933, Ullman's life took a different turn as he became a theatrical producer in New York City. During the Depression, he served as an executive with the Works Progress Administration (1933-37) and later the Federal Theater Project in New York and California (1938-39). As a theatrical producer, Ullman worked on twelve Broadway plays, including co-production of Sidney Kingsley's Pulitzer Prize winning Men in White in 1934.

During World War II, Ullman served with the American Field Service, Volunteer Ambulance Corps, 1942-43. Serving with the British Eighth Army in Africa, he was promoted to lieutenant and received the African Star. From the end of the war until his death in 1971, Ullman worked as a writer fulltime. In addition to writing novels and travelogues, Ullman contributed stories and articles to a wide variety of national periodicals, including Holiday, Saturday Evening Post, Life, Sports Illustrated, and Saturday Review.

Ullman lived the life he described in Banner in the Sky: a world traveler, adventurer, and mountaineer, Ullman climbed many of the world's most challenging mountains. These

include Mt. Olympus, Ixtacihuatl, the Jungfrau, the Matterhorn, the foothills of the Andes, the Tetons, and the Rockies. In 1963 he fulfilled a lifelong ambition by participating in the first American expedition to climb Mt. Everest.

Banner in the Sky was the Newbery Honor Book for 1955 and an ALA Notable Children's Book of 1954. The Booklist critic had this praise: "Based upon the author's personal experiences, with details from the original ascent of the Matterhorn, the story has authenticity, atmosphere, and excitement." Today's readers are equally enthusiastic. A review on amazon.com stated that "Banner in the Sky is the most intriguing story I have ever read. ... Banner in the Sky is a gut-wrenching story about sheer will and determination."

LITERARY TERMS AND APPLICATIONS

For a better understanding of James Ramsey Ullman's style, present the following terms and applications to the novel:

setting the time and place of the action. The setting is crucial to *Banner in the Sky*, because much of the novel revolves around life in the Alps and climbing the Citadel.

figures of speech words and expressions not meant to be taken literally. Figurative language uses words in fresh, new ways to appeal to the imagination. Figures of speech include similes, metaphors, extended metaphors, hyperbole, and personification. Ullman uses many similes, metaphors, and personification to create a poetic style. For example, Ullman uses personification in "the thin finger of cold..." (p. 20) and "the valley of Kurtal was wrapped in a cloak of gray mist" (73).

description a word picture of what something or someone is like. Description is made up of sensory details that help readers form pictures in their minds. For example, on page 253, Ullman describes the mountain as: "Every major summit of the range stood up clear and glittering in the crystal light."

MEANING STUDY

Below are words, phrases, sentences, or thought units that have particular meaning in the novel. Explain the meaning of each. Chapter and page numbers indicate the context from which the item is taken.

- There it stood. The Citadel. The last unconquered summit of the Alps. (Chap. 1, p. 19)
 (All of the great mountains of the Alps have been climbed. The only mountain left unconquered is the great Citadel. The novel is based on fact; the Citadel represents the Matterhorn, the only peak in the Alps still unconquered in 1865, when the novel is set.)
- 2. "You cannot put out a fire by wishing it out. You cannot bottle the wind." (Chap. 3, p. 41) (Rudi's uncle and his mother do not want him to be a climber because it is a risky and ill-paying job. Instead, they want him to pursue a career in the hotel business. To that end, they have gotten him a job as a dishwasher with old Teo. However, Teo recognizes and respects Rudi's spirit, his courage and determination to be a mountain climber. Teo sees that the mountains are in Rudi's blood, as they were in his father's.)
- 3. "Yes," Franz agreed, "he is not built for the mountains." (Chap. 3. p. 44) (Ironically, Rudi is small and slender, with pale skin and an "angel-face." However, as subsequent events prove, his small stature and gentle bearing belie a fierce spirit and great physical strength and endurance.)
- "He was thinking, not of himself, but of another."
 (Chap. 6, p. 83)
 (As Teo recounts, when Sir Edward was injured)
 - (As Teo recounts, when Sir Edward was injured trying to scale the Citadel, Rudi's father Josef stayed with him overnight in a small cave while Teo went for help. While Josef was freezing to death, he had taken off his shirt to try to keep Sir Edward alive. Josef gave his life to protect another, the essence of the mountain guide's credo.)
- 5. Everything was gone, except the white thundering fury of the Citadel that bore him on and on...(Chap. 8, p. 114) (When Rudi is trapped in a life-threatening avalanche, readers understand the enormous difficulty in mountain climbing and the great courage and resourcefulness it takes to stay alive. This passage captures all the tension and danger of trying to climb any great peak, but especially one like the Citadel.)
- 6. "I drink to Rudi Matt," he said, "—the only true mountaineer in Kurtal." (Chap. 9, p. 122)

- (When Rudi sets off to conquer the Citadel on his own, Teo salutes his audacity and spirit.)
- 7. "To climb is in his blood, in his bones." (Chap. 13, p. 175) (Teo stands up for Rudi, defying Franz to assert Rudi's birthright: being a mountain climber. Teo's defense is all the more powerful because he was so badly crippled on the climb that killed Rudi's father.)
- 8. "In trying to live Rudi's life for him, instead of letting him live it on his own." (Chap. 17, p. 244)
 (Rudi's mother realizes she had no right to force Rudi into the hotel business. Her motivation was honest—she did not want him to die on the mountains as her husband, his father, had done. Nonetheless, she now realizes she was afraid to face the truth: Rudi must live his own life and fulfill his own dreams, no matter how dangerous they are.)
- 9. His father's son. (Chap. 18, p. 270)
 (At the novel's climax, Rudi passes up the chance to be among the first—if not the first—to ascend the Citadel. Instead, he opts to save Saxo's life. In so doing, Rudi fulfills his father's legacy of self-sacrifice.)
- "Here is the conqueror of the Citadel." (Chap. 19, p. 280) (In a highly emotional scene, Captain Winter gives Rudi credit for having been the first to scale the peak of the Citadel. This shows Winter's generous, gracious spirit.)

COMPREHENSION STUDY

Answer the following questions in your own words. There is not always a right answer. Your judgment is important and you should be ready to defend your answers by referring to passages in the book.

Questions 1-5 (Literal Level)

- 1. How is Rudi's appearance unusual for his place and goals?
 - (Rudi is small, slight, and sweet-faced. The other men of Kurtal are big, brawny, and harsh-featured. Rudi's appearance makes it unlikely he could be a successful mountain guide or mountain climber.)
- 2. What career does Rudi's mother want him to pursue? Why?
 - (Ilse Matt wants her son to be in the hotel business so he will be safe from the dangers of mountain climbing. She does not want him to die in a climbing accident as her husband did.)
- 3. Why does Rudi keep running away from the hotel kitchen?
 - (Rudi is unable to resist the lure of the glorious mountains. He is drawn to the wide open spaces and danger.)
- How did Rudi's father die?
 (He froze to death while staying behind with the man he was guiding, Sir Edward, who had been injured by falling rocks.)
- 5. Where in the novel does Rudi show great courage? (Possible response: Among the most dramatic incidents occurs early on, when Rudi risks freezing by taking off all his clothes to rig up a line to save Captain Winter.)

Questions 6-8 (Interpretative Level)

- 6 Why does Rudi decide to climb the mountain?
 (He simply had to do it, compelled by the desire to be the first to conquer the mountain. He might also be bound by his father's heritage and the intense competition around him.)
- 7. Why does Rudi rescue Saxo rather than climbing to the summit?
 - (As "his father's son," Rudi is moved to forsake personal glory to save someone else's life. Rudi feels a "clearness as deep and cold and pure as mountain sky" when he realizes that the spirit of self-sacrifice is his father's true legacy.)
- 8. Why does Winter hang Josef's red shirt at Citadel's summit?

(Winter pays homage to Josef's valiant attempt to reach the summit. In so doing, he is also saluting all the brave climbers who died attempting to scale the Citadel.)

Questions 9 and 10 (Critical Level)

- What do you think the climb to the Citadel symbolizes? (Possible response: Heroic human endeavor, the unconquerable human spirit, the best in humanity.)
- 10. Do you agree with Winter that the Citadel is really Rudi's mountain? Why or why not?

(Possible response: Yes, because Rudi would have been the first to reach it if he had not decided to save Saxo's life; No, because Winter was the first to reach the summit, not Rudi.)

Questions 11-12 (Creative Level)

- Write a brief sequel to the story in which you describe Rudi's life as an adult.
- Working with a small group of classmates, role-play a dialogue between Rudi and Saxo in which Rudi explains why he saved Saxo's life.
