SYNOPSIS

Daniel, a Galilean, has run away from home to join Rosh, who is raising an army to fight the Roman rule over their country, Palestine. He meets two old friends, Joel and his twin sister, Thace, who have come to the hills for a picnic. After rejoining Rosh's band, Daniel helps free a big, strong, black slave named Samson. This slave becomes attached to Daniel when Daniel files off his chains.

Daniel returns to the city for a visit to his family, his grandmother and sister, Leah, who is full of fear and never leaves the house. They celebrate a Jewish Sabbath. Daniel accompanies Simon to the temple to hear a famous prophet from Nazareth speak. Daniel is impressed with Jesus. Daniel then returns to the hills and to Rosh.

He again hears Jesus speak after he goes to Capernaum in search of Joel Joel's father wants the Jews to wait peacefully for the Romans to leave their country, but Daniel wants to fight.

After being impudent to a Roman guard, Daniel is wounded and flees to Joel's house, where Thace helps him tend his wounds. He tells Joel how the Romans killed his parents. Together, Daniel, Joel, and Thace vow to fight the Romans.

Thinking about Joel and Thace's normal family life, Daniel becomes discontented with life in the hills. Simon gives up his job and follows the Preacher from Nazareth. Daniel and Joel listen to Jesus talk to the people.

Daniel returns home and comforts his dying grandmother. He and Leah move into Simon's house, where he becomes a blacksmith. Leah begins to cook, weave, and garden.

Joel and Daniel begin recruiting other boys for the revolution. Joel continues to go hear the Carpenter. Thace and Leah become friends.

Daniel returns to the hills for a visit with Rosh. Daniel ponders where he belongs, in the city or in the hills. Finally, he returns to Capernaum.

Daniel follows Jesus more closely and listens to his sermons, but makes a small bronze bow with a different view to its purpose than those teachings. Leah becomes less shy.

Rosh gives Joel an order to gather information about friends and foes in Capernaum. Daniel and Thace help by leaving the city together, Thace disguised as her twin, Joel. Rosh steals money from the rich using Joel's information. Daniel's recruits in town start taking Roman helmets and other equipment. Townspeople are angry at Rosh for stealing their goods. Joel is captured by the Romans. When Daniel asks Rosh for help to free him and is refused,

Daniel leaves Rosh's army to rescue Joel. With Samson's help, Daniel and his group of boys rescue Joel from the Romans. However, one boy, Nathan, dies.

Joel visits Daniel and talks about Thace getting married. He asks Daniel to warn Jesus about his enemies, the priests. When Daniel warns Jesus that the priests hate him, Jesus asks him to forget his own hate and follow him, but Daniel cannot understand such forgiveness.

When confronted by Thacia, Daniel tells her he can't love her because he needs to fight. When he returns home, Daniel finds that his sister has been seeing Marcus, a Roman, against his wishes. He becomes extremely angry and Leah withdraws into herself. Soon she is dying and Daniel thinks of Jesus for help but is unable to reach him through the crowds which call him Messiah and want to crown him King. Daniel sends a message to Thacia about Leah's illness, but time passes with no word from her. The Roman soldier comes to see Leah, but Daniel won't let him in. Finally Thacia arrives with Jesus and Leah is cured. Daniel is filled with love and allows the Roman in to see Leah.

AUTHOR SKETCH

Elizabeth Speare's first book was *Calico Captive*, published in 1957. She was a two-time winner of the Newbery Medal for *The Witch of Blackbird Pond* (1959) and *The Bronze Bow* (1962).

Speare lives in New England, currently in Connecticut. She acquired a Master's Degree from Boston University in 1932, and then taught English.

Speare carefully researches each subject she writes about, sometimes spending more than a year gathering information. This makes her characters and settings come to life for the reader.

CRITIC'S CORNER

This exciting adventure story takes place in Galilee and Capernaum when the Romans were in control. It depicts a young Jewish boy's life in ancient times, and chronicles the life of Christ and his affect in changing the boy's feelings of hate to feelings of love. The novel is written in a warm, realistic, slice of life manner, and should be interesting to all students.

- 3. To comprehend how Thace and Marcus enable Leah to overcome her fears
- 4. To understand why some Jews chose violence as a way of driving out the Romans

INTRODUCTORY ACTIVITIES

- Predict what the story will be about from the book cover and title.
- 2. Locate Israel and the Middle East on maps and globes.
- 3. Collect pre-existing knowledge students have about Christ, Israel, the Roman Empire, and Judaism.
- Present a brief history of Israel and the Jewish people or have students research both.
- View the videotape Shalom Sesame, which teaches students about the geography, culture and people of Israel. (Phone 410-461-5189.)
- While reading the story, collect figurative language, wise sayings of Christ, and half sentences which aren't finished.
- 7. Discuss historic events which show that hate produces pain or harm.
- 8. Discuss historic events which show that love produces healing and well-being.
- 10. Discuss why wars start.

WORD STUDY ACTIVITY

Keep an index card file of the new vocabulary. The new word is written at the top of the card. Under that is written the sentence from the book which contains the word. Next, the dictionary definition is written with the phonetic respelling, part of speech, etymology, etc. Finally, the word is written in an original sentence.

With a partner, quiz each other on the meaning and spelling of each word.
