Synopsis

Mayo Cornelius Higgins (better known as M.C.) is a 13-year-old boy who lives high atop Sarah's Mountain in a remote area of southern Ohio. M.C. has assigned himself the task of getting his family away from the impending dangers created by strip mining.

M.C.'s great grandmother Sarah (an escaped slave) had stumbled upon the mountain during a dense fog. M.C. is very proud that his family owns the mountain named for his ancestor. However, M.C. is torn between his love for the mountain and his fear of the huge spoil heap (waste material left after digging for coal) sliding down and covering the ledge where their home is located.

When word that a talent scout was interested in discovering new singers from the area reaches M.C., he begins to plan. He places all hopes of escaping the spoil heap on the chance that James Lewis (the talent scout) is going to want his mother to leave the mountain to become a recording star. He reasons that the family couldn't let Banina (his mother) go alone, thus the entire family would leave the mountain.

When M.C. finally meets James Lewis, his fears are reinforced as Lewis visits the spoil heap and predicts its movement in the near future. This intensifies his desire to leave the mountain.

M.C. is the proud owner of a forty-foot steel pole that is positioned in the middle of a junk heap in their yard. To the top of this pole, M.C. has attached a bicycle seat, pedals and two tricycle wheels. He is very possessive of this pole and allows no one else to try to climb to his seat. M.C. spends numerous hours perched in the seat, swaying back and forth. From his perch he can keep an eye on his younger brothers and sister swimming in the lake, he can also see the nearest town, the surrounding hills, mountains and anyone who climbs Sarah's Mountain.

M.C. and his friend, Ben Killburn meet secretly because M.C.'s family believes that Ben and his relatives possess strange powers and are witches. Ben and his relatives, although they do possess the common trait that gives each a sixth finger and toe, are quite normal. The Killburns, like many African Americans and Southerners, use old fashioned methods for healing purposes. Also, the Killburn family members have light complexions and light reddish hair. However, it seems as though they have no eyebrows (the hair is so fair) and each has light eyes. Such differences add to the Higgins' fear of them.

Conflicts are the norm in M.C.'s relationship with his father, therefore he hides his friendship with Ben. M.C. learns during a conversation

with his mother that his hope of the family leaving the mountain will not materialize. Banina reveals why Jones (M.C.'s father) would never leave. Jones' ancestors, including Sarah, are buried on the very site where M.C.'s pole is positioned. At Banina's insistence, Jones had removed the stones, in their place he had hauled pieces of junk cars up the mountain and piled them where the stones had been. In this way he had created a monument to the dead, and refused to leave them. When presented with this information, M.C. simply decides to leave Jones behind.

In the woods one dark evening, M.C. decides to sneak up on a stranger using a lantern to find the way. He meets his match when a fiesty teenager, Lurhetta Outlaw, doesn't fall into his trap. M.C. finds Lurhetta attractive and feels he'll never be the same. She, however, challenges him at every chance, belittling him about everything from his age to his family's bias toward the Killburns. Due to Lurhetta's taunts he defies his father and visits the Killburn place.

Hard, cold reality begins to take hold of M.C. when James Lewis reveals that he never truly intended to make a star of Banina. He was simply gathering recordings.

M.C. feels betrayed but still has a glimmer of hope that he will have Lurhetta's friendship. His second disappointment comes when he discovers Lurhetta has deserted her lake campsite without saying goodbye, thus dashing his hopes of a continuing relationship.

M.C. finally accepts defeat in trying to leave the mountain. But he decides he can do something to alter fate. He decides to build a wall at the back of the house as a measure of protection from the collapse. When Jones sees what M.C. is doing he offers advice. M.C. immediately rejects his suggestions, asserting that he will work for Mr. Killburn, and will be friends with whomever he wishes. He then calls for his friend Ben, who always hides somewhere nearby, to come out into the open. M.C. is ready to defend his right to befriend Ben, even if it means using his knife on his father.

Biographical Sketch

Virginia Hamilton was born on March 12, 1936. She was raised in Yellow Springs, Ohio and attended Antioch College. She began writing stories at an early age.

Ms. Hamilton has produced many works for children and is recognized as one of the most influential authors of books about Black children. She is also credited with being one of the top image makers for Black Americans.

Ms. Hamilton has received numerous awards and honors for her writing. She received the Lewis Carroll Shelf Award, Boston Globe-Horn Book Award, John Newbery Medal and the National Book Award, all for M.C. Higgins, The Great.

Critic's Corner

M.C. Higgins, The Great presents an extensive picture of life from a young, impressionable boy's viewpoint. Ms. Hamilton has allowed the readers to identify and empathize with characters who appear different and are isolated from society. Ms. Hamilton also provides readers with the knowledge that even though one is different, there are still commonalities between individuals. Ms. Hamilton allows us to watch as a youngster matures enough to note that he can determine his future and his relationships.

Objectives

- 1. To understand the motivation of the main character
- 2. To interpret the relationship between M.C. and his father
- To analyze the nature of superstition and its influence on the behavior of man
- 4. To examine the concepts of optimism, realism and pessimism
- To examine the maturation of a young boy as he moves from dependent to independent decision making

Meaning Study

Burlap capes cover their backs, they carry 50-pound blocks of ice using tongs on their backs and maintain a peculiar stance. They figure the price in sign language. Jones was afraid of the witchey men, didn't want them to close to the house or himself.
- 16. What prompted M.C. to visit the Killburn place? (p. 210) *M.C. went because of Lurhetta's taunts.*
- 17. What was the general impression you received from the description of Ben's family? (p. 210-238)

 They were normal, hard working people, who happened to look and live differently from their neighbors.

Student Activities

- 1. Research the subject of superstition.
 - a) Identify several superstitions and how people act accordingly.
 - b) Conduct a survey of family, friends, neighbors and people at random (with adult supervision). Ask questions about the person's superstitious beliefs and the degree to which they conform to the belief.
 - c) Compile a summary of the findings and present it to the class. (This can be done as individuals or in groups.)
- Explain the concepts of optimisim, realism and pessimism as ways of describing a person's outlook on life. Give examples for each. Have students identify the type they characterize or have a friend or classmate identify student's type from observations.
- Present a science lesson and/or have students research the topic of strip mining. Identify the process followed and the resultant problems.
- 4. Use a map of the U.S. to mark all locations mentioned in the text.
- 5. Write/create a different ending to the book or continue the story.
