Synopsis

Chapter 1 - Live Cargo!

A Spanish Galleon is in deep trouble. The ship is pitching and tossing in the rising swell of the sea. It is filled with a cargo of ponies being sent to work in the gold mines of Peru. Suddenly, the ship strikes a shoal and the

hull cracks open. Only fifteen ponies manage to survive. They scramble up the Assateague Beach, that long sandy island which shelters the tidewater country of Virginia and Maryland.

Chapter 2 - The Island of the Wild Things

The ponies are exhausted and their coats are heavy with water, but they are free. They adapt more to their new environment as each season comes. People come and go from Assateague, but the wild ponies stay. It has become their special home.


Chapter 3 - The Phantom

On a windy Saturday morning, halfpast March, a young brother and sister are playing on the White Hills of Assateague. Their names are Paul and Maureen. Their grandfather has brought the game warden to the island

and they are allowed to come along. In the midst of their exploring, a band of wild ponies sweep by them. This starts Paul thinking about Pony Penning Day. This year he is old enough to go. He feels confident he can capture the Phantom. He and Maureen make a plan to earn a hundred dollars to buy the pony of their dream.

Chapter 4 - Sacred Bones

Paul and Maureen are full of questions about the history of the wild ponies. They want to know whether the stories are fact or legend. Grandpa Beebe sets them straight. "Course it's a legend," he says, "but legends be the only stories as is true!" The children learn that Pony Penning Day started as a fun holiday. It's still fun, but now it's needed to thin the herd. The money from the sale goes to buy fire-fighting equipment.



Chapter 5 - A Piece of Wind and Sky

Paul and Maureen make plans about raising the \$100 for Phantom. They have Grandpa give them the ten extra dollars he'll get for the colts they halter-break. They haven't told him what the money is for yet. The summer is spent doing all kinds of odd jobs. Asking to rent one of Grandpa's empty stalls for Pony Penning Day

> to keep Phantom in lets their secret out. Grandpa warns them, "The Phantom ain't a hoss. She ain't even a lady. She's just a piece of wind and sky." However, he lets them keep planning.

Chapter 6 - Pony Penning Day

At last Pony Penning Day arrives. Paul awakes before first light. He lies quiet, gathering his wits. Suddenly, he shoots out of bed ready to go. He will ride Watch Eyes, a dependable pony that Grandpa has never been able to sell. You can tell that all the men are excited. When the men come upon a herd of wild ponies they send Paul to chase a straggler. They want to be rid of him. It turns out that the straggler is Phantom and she's got a baby colt. She is headed for Tom's Point, the round up spot.

Chapter 7 - She Can't Turn Back

Mouths gape in disbelief. Paul is bringing in the Phantom and a colt! The men accept Paul as one of them now. Paul names the colt Misty. The beach is wild with commotion as the roundup men rush at the ponies, driving them into the water heading for home.

Chapter 8 - Caught In the Whirlpool

The shores of Chincoteague are crowded with people who strain to watch the ponies cross. A fisherman with binoculars gives a shouting account of their progress. He reports seeing the Phantom and her colt who won't swim. The roundup men shove the colt in the water and it is being sucked down in a whirlpool. Paul jumps in and swims against the current to save the colt.

Chapter 9 - On to the Pony Penning Grounds Maureen begins to worry that the hundred dollars isn't

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enough to pay for Phantom and her colt. Paul makes up a plan. He and Maureen will get to the Pony Penning Grounds at sunup. They'll be the first to see the fire chief. They'll make a deal to earn another hundred dollars within four months to buy Misty too. It seems like a good plan.

Chapter 10 - Colts Have Got to Grow Up

As Paul and Maureen look at Misty, they know she is the finest-blooded foal in the world. The crowd keeps asking Paul questions about the channel rescue. He and Maureen scarcely hear the questions. They are concerned about the colts being separated from their mothers. They think it's cruel. The fire chief explains that they are old enough to fend for themselves and actually, it's the kindest way to teach them independence.

Chapter11 - Storm-Shy

Throngs hurry back to the Pony Penning Grounds to watch the big race. For three years in a row Black Comet has won. This night is no different. Paul keeps saying next year the Phantom will win. Grandpa had predicted a big storm. It hits just as the race ends. Paul races to the colt pens to see if Misty is all right. At first, he can't find her. Then, he discovers Grandpa has put Misty and Phantom under a piece of tarpaulin in the back of his truck. Paul stays the night with the ponies. It builds a bond of trust between Phantom and Paul.

Chapter 12 - The Sold Rope

Maureen goes to the pony sale to seek out the fire chief. Paul is exhausted from his stay in the truck the previous night. The chief is "Nowheres about. He's been and gone." Maureen walks around the ground waiting for his return, so that she can make a deal for Misty. Suddenly, her eyes fly wide with horror. There is a sold rope tied around Misty's neck! She is too late.

Chapter 13 - A Pony Changes Hands

Paul takes the news without a word. The day that was to be so full of excitement drags on. It is Saturday before they are able to talk about their loss. Each blames himself. They decide to use the money they have saved to buy their grandparents an electric toaster. As they shop, a station wagon pulls over to the curb. A boy excitedly tells Paul and Maureen that he won the free pony. The problem is that he already owns a pony and he likes the one he won better than the one he bought. Paul and Maureen can hardly breathe. Misty can be theirs after all.

Chapter 14 - The Wickie

Misty accepts human beings right from the start. Never was a colt more curious! It is days, however, before Phantom will let anyone touch her. Gradually, she changes, even letting Paul and Maureen ride her. It isn't necessary to use a metal bit because she is so easy to control.

Chapter 15 - The Fire Chief Pays A Call

There is no doubt about it. The Phantom is wild with happiness when she races. With the passing days the island folk begin to notice her speed. One late afternoon the fire chief pays a surprise call. He's come to see the owners of Phantom. He wants to know if they'd be interested in racing the Phantom against Black Comet? Maureen says, "from the first moment we saw Phantom we talked about racing her against Black Comet." "And may the best hoss win!" adds Grandpa.

Chapter 16 - The Pully Bone

The next three months are filled with excitement. Paul and Maureen are conditioning Phantom for the big race. Misty even starts to grow jealous of the attention given to her mother. As July draws near, something comes between Paul and Maureen: they both want to ride Phantom in the race. Grandma settles the question. She gets the pully bone from the marsh hen. The one who breaks off the biggest part gets to ride Phantom. Paul is the winner. Maureen admits, "You'll ride her better anyhow."

Chapter 17 - Wings On Her Feet

The big event this year at Pony Penning Day is the race, not the wild ponies. As the race starts, Phantom is far back. Phantom is not running a race, she was enjoying herself. In a close finish, Phantom wins by a length. Paul enters the winners circle and has Maureen swing up behind him. They head home to tell Grandma they've won twelve whole dollars.

Chapter18 - A Wild Bugle

After the excitement of the day before, matters on Pony Ranch are settling down to their usual routine. Paul lets Maureen ride first. He is trying to make it up to her for not riding in the race. As Paul waves Maureen in for his turn; they hear the sound of a ringing neigh in the distance. It's the Pied Piper. He's coming to get Phantom. Paul doesn't try to hold Phantom back. He gives her her freedom. She gives one last look toward Misty, as if to say, "Take good care of my baby."

Timeline

Many years ago In the twentieth century	Spanish ponies from the low land moors of Spain, a gift to the Viceroy of Peru, swim ashore from a shipwrecked Spanish galleon to Assateague Island off the coast of Virginia. There they establish a race of wild ponies. Brother and sister Paul and Maureen are on Assateague Island with their Grandfather and the game warden. They spy a herd of ponies running by, including a fast mare
	known as the Phantom. Paul hatches a plan to capture her for the upcoming Pony Penning Day.
Later	Paul and Maureen save up \$100 to buy the Phantom at Pony Penning Day.
Pony Penning Day	Paul earns the respect of the local men by retrieving the Phantom and her colt, Misty. The children hatch a plan to buy the colt as well, but the plan is thwarted; Misty is sold.
Several days later	The boy who won Misty wants to give her back; Paul and Maureen will get her anyway.
The following year	Paul and Maureen train the Phantom and Misty. Paul will ride the Phantom in the race at the next Pony Penning Day.
Finally	Paul wins the race. Later, at the Pony Ranch, the children watch as the Phantom, with a back ward glance, answers the call of her mate, the Pied Piper, leaving Misty in their care.

Author Sketch

Marguerite Henry (April 13, 1902-November 26, 1997) was an American writer of nearly sixty books based on true stories of horses and other animals. During her long career, she won several Newbery Awards and Honors. *Misty of Chincoteague*, her most famous work, was made into a movie in 1961.

Critic's Comer

Misty of Chincoteague won a Newbery Honor when it was published in 1947. It is based on the true story of a Chincoteague Pony named Misty, who was born on Chincoteague Island in 1946 to Pied Piper (her sire) and Phantom. The story tells of a real family, the Beebes, and their efforts to raise the wild pony. The book, which has become a classic, won critical acclaim from a number of sources, including the *San Francisco Chronicle*, which called it "a thrilling and long-to-be-remembered tale," and the *American Library Association Booklist*, which called it "an exceptionally appealing book." Misty died in 1972, at the age of 26, and is still famous, especially on Chincoteague.
