


Cactus Joe is a **saguaro cactus** (pronounced sah-wah-ruh), found only in the Sonoran Desert in the southwestern United States and northwestern Mexico. The saguaro is the largest cactus in the United States, and one of the largest in Mexico, and can grow over 40 feet tall. Saguaro cacti support lots of life in the desert.




Gilded flickers and Gila woodpeckers make nest holes in the saguaro's pulpy flesh. This doesn't harm the cactus.



**Saguaros** flower when they reach between 30 and 65 years old.








**Tortoise**
